#### **Hort Farm's New Pavilion**

### Kitty Werner, Curator

When I joined the International Lilac Society in 2019 after being appointed curator, my dream was to have someone come to our lilacs and help me identify them. May 13, I received an email from Josh Miller, of the ILS's Preservation Committee who wanted to know if he could come and do just that. Was I dreaming? How could I refuse.

Josh arrived on May 23 at 9:30 and didn't leave until 3:30. Josh and I quickly toured the lilacs, then using printouts he had downloaded off our website (https://fhfvt.org/collections/lilacs/), we started at 1-1 'Saugeana' and worked our way through everyone of the lilacs, row by row—at this point, about 100 of them.

Josh confirmed, corrected a name, took notes and plenty of photos of the ones he had questions about.

There were many surprises, such as when I pointed out a stray lilac that grew next to the irrigation pipe between the two 'Paul Thirion' lilacs. "That's a 'Maiden's Blush'!" Now, where did that one come from? Supposedly, we had one at one time, but the one that was named as 'Maiden's Blush' turned out to be a different cultivar.

Sadly, several lilacs had died this year, mostly likely due to the weird weather. Ones that were covered with

blooms last year were reduced to a fraction of their size.

The DynaPower team had cleaned out so many dead canes, those poor lilacs looked like goners. But, if you looked down, there were plenty of new shoots surrounding the bases. There's hope!

Since we do have some lilacs that are on the rare side, Josh asked if he could dig up shoots of a few lilacs to take them to the arboretum that makes sure we can keep these lilacs alive and thriving. With our luck here, I was thrilled.

Years ago, our little 'Dr. Masters' died. Josh presented me with a replacement from the ILS.

Josh told me he rarely enjoys being in the lilacs as he is usually focused on the job at hand.

On this visit, he thoroughly enjoyed himself. He had a chance to stop and smell the lilacs.

We both did.
